FROM THE DIRECTOR



Governor Whitmer,

This has been a transformational year for the Department of Military and Veterans Affairs and contributions of our soldiers and airmen have been instrumental in our success.

Michigan had the privilege of hosting the first combined annual conferences for the National Guard Association of the United States and the Enlisted Association of the National Guard of the United States this past August in Detroit. Motor City 2024 welcomed more than 5,000 attendees from all over the world and allowed us to highlight Michigan's efforts working with industry and academia to continue building our readiness for serving here at home and abroad.

We also welcomed a new partner nation to the State Partnership Program this past September. Joining Latvia and Liberia, Sierra Leone became our newest partner during a formal ceremony in their nation's capital, Freetown. We already have events on the calendar for 2025 and beyond to mutually benefit the growth of both partners. Earlier this year, Michigan National Guard members traveled to Liberia to assist with preparation for their Non-Commissioned Officer Academy including instructor assessments. Latvian Zemessardze soldiers joined Michigan engineers during their annual training this summer, where they participated in construction and command post exercises.

Throughout 2024, the MING answered the call around the globe with soldiers and airmen mobilized across the United States, Europe, Africa, the Middle East, and Asia. Just this fall, we mobilized service members to assist our fellow Guardsmen in North Carolina and Florida, providing critical personnel and equipment support to their ongoing hurricane relief missions.

Michigan has not sat idly by as advances in technology and information continue to change the world. We continue to invest in the development of our personnel and seek innovative technologies that will make us successful in the multi-domain warfight. The Exercise Northern Strike series grew again in its 12th year, incorporating innovative technology including a simulated Base Defense Operations Center. For the first time, service members also had the opportunity to train with a focus on homeland defense against realistic and challenging threats. Relationships with departments such as the newly established Michigan Office of Defense and Aerospace Innovation will be instrumental in promoting the full potential of Exercise Northern Strike and our military training facilities in 2025.

We also continue to invest in our people every day. This year we made large-scale improvements to a number of our armories and installations across the state to better meet the training and readiness of our men and women. We also saw promotions of several senior leaders in our organization, who I know will carry this momentum into 2025.

The DMVA remains committed to our mission of giving back to veterans and their communities. This year, the Michigan Veterans Affairs Agency administered more than \$13.8 million of grant funding in support of veteran suicide prevention and \$1.7 million in direct assistance using the Michigan Veteran Trust Fund. Meanwhile, the Michigan Veterans Homes team worked in conjunction with state legislators to secure resources needed to relocate and update the D.J. Jacobetti Veterans Home in Marquette.

Every effort we made and every milestone we achieved supported the 'Member for Life' concept that is at the heart of the DMVA. I am incredibly grateful for all of our men and women and eager to see what awaits us in 2025.





MICHIGAN VETERANS AFFAIRS AGENCY

The Michigan Veterans Affairs Agency is the central coordinating agency for the state, providing support, care, advocacy and service to more than 516,000 veterans and their families. The MVAA also seeks to make Michigan a destination that veterans and their families choose to live, raise a family, work, retire and play.

PARTNERSHIPS & OUTREACH

- Created partnership with Michigan Economic Development Corporation to expand opportunities for Michigan employers to reach veterans nationally.
- Featured on the nationally-broadcast Military Makeover Operation Career program.
- Traveled the state to pin more than 250 Vietnam-era veterans with the Vietnam Veteran Recognition Lapel Pin.
- Expanded partnership with the Michigan Department of Natural Resources, including advertising in the DNR Digest and adding 988 Crisis Line info to fishing and hunting licenses.

MENTAL HEALTH & SUICIDE PREVENTION

- Established MVAA's Mental Health and Suicide Prevention team in January 2024, integrating multiple programs for a comprehensive approach.
- Continued the Staff Sgt. Parker Gordon Fox Suicide Prevention Grant for the third year, adding \$750,000 for suicide prevention efforts and seeing a 400% increase in cases over FY23.
- MVAA's Mental Health First Aid training in May 2024 equipped all DMVA staff to address suicide prevention and connect those in need with the right resources.







MICHIGAN VETERANS AFFAIRS AGENCY

HOMELESSNESS & HOUSING SUPPORT

Increased the Homelessness Prevention Grant by \$500,000, offering up to \$250,000 per grantee for housing resources. The Michigan Veteran Resource Service Center handled 28,000+ cases and spent more than 2,070 hours on the phone helping veterans secure their earned benefits.

VETERAN-FRIENDLY EMPLOYER & SCHOOL PROGRAMS:

- Secured new employers and level upgrades for the Veteran-Friendly Employer program, adding Gold level partners like the Michigan Department of Insurance and Financial Services, Securatech, United Wholesale Mortgage and Steelcase.
- Expanded the VFE program to 179 employers.
- Grew the Veteran-Friendly Schools program to 62 active schools, including 44 gold, 16 silver and 2 bronze schools across Michigan.

COMMUNITY & HEALTH INITIATIVES:

- Partnered with Delta Dental and My Community Dental Clinics of Michigan to support veteran dental health through grants.
- Developed Military Cultural Awareness Training in collaboration with the Michigan Department of Health & Human Services.
- Organized Michigan's first-ever Veterans Harm Reduction Summit, exploring the link between medication and veteran suicide, with more events planned for 2025.

VETERAN ENGAGEMENT & BENEFITS RECOVERY:

- Expanded the staff of Veteran Engagement Officers from 6 to 11, ensuring that each of Michigan's 10 Prosperity Regions had dedicated support for veterans.
- Veteran Service Officers recovered more than \$2 million in benefits for 147 veterans and their families despite staffing challenges.

Michigan Veteran Homes is proud to continue its 135+ year tradition of providing exceptional long-term care for veterans. With locations in Grand Rapids, Marquette, and Chesterfield Township, MVH delivers nation-leading care to enhance the well-being of veterans and their families. Exciting developments include the ongoing construction of a \$96 million veteran home in the Upper Peninsula and a facility expansion in Grand Rapids to improve services and infrastructure.

STATE OPERATIONS

State Operations is a vital enabler for the Michigan Army National Guard, Michigan Air National Guard, Michigan Veterans Affairs Agency, and Michigan Veteran Homes. It oversees programs such as Youth Challenge, Job Challenge, Starbase, the MING State Tuition Assistance Program, and the Military Family Relief Fund.

As a division of the DMVA, State Operations includes financial services and the ChalleNGe Academy. Financial services is composed of budget, procurement, and IT teams. DMVA's budget team manages budget development, federal agreements, tuition assistance, the Family Relief Fund, armory rentals, travel, training, and inventory. Procurement oversees purchasing, contracts, procurement cards, fleet management, and logistics for state active duty. The IT section, established in 2021, handles privacy, security, project management, and governance.

MICHIGAN YOUTH CHALLENGE ACADEMY PROVIDING PURPOSE

PROVIDING PURPOSE AND DIRECTION

The Michigan Youth ChalleNGe Academy educates, trains, and mentors at-risk youth in a quasi-military environment at no cost to participants, giving young people the skills to become productive and responsible citizens. Applying the military model to alternative education, the Academy promotes competency development through academic opportunities, life skills, and vocational preparation. Graduates of the MYCA are eligible for the Michigan Job ChalleNGe.

The program focuses on career preparation and provides opportunities for academic accreditation. Both the MYCA and Michigan Job ChalleNGe Program are free to participants and there is no requirement for military obligation. In 2024, the MYCA celebrated its twenty-fifth anniversary and graduated its fiftieth class.



NATIONAL ALL-DOMAIN WARFIGHTING CENTER

NADWC

The NADWC includes the nearly 148,000 acres of training space at the Camp Grayling Joint Maneuver Training Center and 17,000 square miles of special use military airspace at the Alpena Combat Readiness Training Center. The area offers training for entities across the Department of Defense to prepare for the battlefield of the future. The NADWC provides units with training capabilities across all five warfighting domains.

Land - Camp Grayling is a leader in providing efficient, unparalleled, customer-focused service and the highest level of modern training. It offers a unique combination of resources that provide a wide variety of training scenarios to meet unit readiness requirements. Large artillery, mortar, tank ranges, and maneuver courses are among the highlights available for visiting units.

Air - The airspace, which extends over a portion of Lake Huron, is supported by three Michigan Air National Guard installations: the Alpena Combat Readiness Training Center, Battle Creek Air National Guard Base, and Selfridge Air National Guard Base. These air bases provide air-to-air maneuver capabilities, long-range precision fires, premier command and control capabilities, and close air support for ground forces training at Camp Grayling.

Maritime - Partially located on Lake Huron, the NADWC offers units the opportunity to train on, around, and above our nation's second-largest lake and one of the largest freshwater bodies of water in the world. When paired with Lake Margrethe on Camp Grayling, units can accomplish a range of maritime and littoral training objectives.

Cyberspace - With combined assets from across the state, the NADWC also has the ability to host live cyber attack and defense exercises. For kinetic units, the training area can simulate electronic warfare and replicate a contested environment using joint threat emitters.

Space - Through partnership with industry, visiting units have access to space-based intelligence, surveillance, and reconnaissance for a near real-time picture of the battlefield. As the growing space and near space industry continues expansion in Michigan, there are plans for further space integration in the training environment.





CAMP GRAYLING JOINT MANEUVER TRAINING CENTER

> Camp Grayling is the largest National Guard training facility in the U.S. and the seventhlargest Army installation in the Continental United States. Located in northern Michigan, it spans 148,000 acres of four-season training lands including a 13,000 acres cantonment area with 431 support facilities and the Grayling Army Airfield, 130 square miles of restricted airspace, and extensive electromagnetic spectrum for electronic warfare. The facility employs 75 state employees, 40 federal technicians, 14 Active Guard Reserves, seven seasonal staff, 231 drilling soldiers, and six contractors. Camp Grayling supports Northern Strike exercises, National Guard training, state annual training, civilian first responder training, environmental training, and more, living up to its motto: "Dominate - All Domains!"

SIGNIFICANT EVENTS

- A ribbon cutting was conducted October 27, 2024 for the updated armory on the Grayling Army Airfield, a \$3.1 million project (\$700,000 in state funding and \$2.4 million in federal funding). This project maximized existing infrastructure and reclaimed space to focus on addressing shortfalls with women soldiers' facilities by providing adequate latrines, showers and a lactation room. The project corrected issues of accessibility and functionality with proper storage and modernized the armory with updated HVAC. functionality with proper storage and modernized the armory with updated HVAC, electrical and plumbing.
- Exercise Northern Exposure 2024 hosted the first combined military and civilian mass casualty training event on Camp Grayling including the MING Quick Reaction Force, installation staff, and first responders from across Crawford, Otsego, Cheboygan, and Roscommon counties.

CAMP GRAYLING JOINT MANEUVER TRAINING CENTER

USO MICHIGAN CAMP GRAYLING

- 2024 was the third summer supporting service members training at Camp Grayling
 Joint Maneuver Center. The impact of the USO continues to grow year-over-year from
 9,000 service instances in 2022 to 22,000 service instances in 2023 to nearly 23,000 service instances in 2024.
- This summer also marked the grand opening of the renovated USO Center and new outdoor pavilion through the work of the Lowe's Hometown Grant and the Camp Grayling Department of Public Works. The USO, Lowe's, and DPW gave the building a much-needed facelift with new paint, décor, and furniture. A pavilion with outdoor kitchen was also built adjacent to the Center to accommodate and support more service members.
- service members.
 Service members loved the new look of the Center and to use the pavilion while visiting the USO this summer. With the addition of the pavilion, the USO was able to increase programming outdoors to host programs such as "Double Dogs" with USO canine therapy dogs, more cookouts with yard games such as axe throwing, outdoor movie nights, tie-dye night, and a line dancing class. The USO also hosted two base-wide events including the End of Training Talent Show featuring The Stranded Hobos and Military Appreciation Night featuring The J Hawkins Band. In addition to the support provided through the USO Center and events, during peak training periods, the USO also supported service members in the field. In June, one of the Mobile USO Centers visited for June Annual Training, and in August, both came out to support service members training in Exercise Northern Strike 2024.
 None of what the USO does would be possible without the support of their volunteers. The USO has nearly 30 community members who support the mission of the USO at Camp Grayling. USO volunteers help keep the Center open 7-days a week for peak training periods and 5-days a week throughout the remainder of the summer. COMMUNITY RELATIONS

Camp Grayling is well known for its excellent customer service and community relations. Listed below are some of the top accomplishments in 2024:

- Hosted the first ever Drone Light Show downtown Grayling where over 4,000 people came to watch, bringing tons of business to the area on a slow winter mid-week evening. More than 100,000 viewers tuned in to watch the live feed from around the world.
- Hosted the first ever U.S. Navy Blue Angels Mobile Aircraft Arresting System test landing in preparation for the National Cherry Festival Air Show.
- Hosted the inaugural Boots on the Ground Fallen Heroes Memorial in collaboration with MIARNG and Survivor Outreach Services Team.
- Hosted or attended over 60 community events along with attended monthly township, rotary, veteran coffees, chamber and other local meetings.
- Monthly tours of cantonment along with Air-to-Ground Range where visitors could view the A-10s. An MSU Spartan bus tour with over 70 faculty also visited in October.
- Camp Grayling, along with the National Guard Association of Michigan, hosted their third Annual Kentucky Derby Gala where they raised over \$30,000 for the Guardian Angel Medical Service Dogs and \$5,000 at the Northern Strike 5k to benefit the Wellness and Recreation Program and the National Guard Association of Michigan Leadership Scholarship.
- Annually Camp Grayling partners with the Crawford AuSable Community Thanksgiving Dinner where they feed more than 1,000 local community members, military and veterans.
- With USO support, hosted a Military Appreciation Night and Talent Show during State AT and Northern Strike.
- Community and followers are kept up to date via local radio, email, Instagram, Facebook and LinkedIn.









ALPENA COMBAT READINESS TRAINING CENTER

The Alpena CRTC provides premier training support, facilities, instruction, and airspace to Department of Defense, Department of Homeland Security, coalition, and emergency responders to meet the mission requirements of combatant commanders and civil authorities.

SIGNIFICANT EVENTS AND ACCOMPLISHMENTS

• Completed \$60 million repair of primary joint use airfield runway.

• Supported Latvian National Armed Forces to accommodate Baltic Air Police missions and assisted with scramble procedures. Provided sUAS administrative guidance to Latvian pilots allowing them to fly in Latvian controlled airspace.

• Transported all equipment for three Agile Combat Exercise training locations.

• Supported over 1,350 training sorties with fuel, munitions, air traffic control, and safety.

• Supported 531 hours of range time for 16 units employing over \$2.7 million in munitions.

ACRTC Fire Department responded to 255 emergency calls including 83 EMS, 74
 Structural, 14 ARFF incidents, two HAZMAT (one Class One aircraft spill), and 82 fire alarms, protecting not only the installation but the local community that services 14 mutual aid agreements.

Participated in and supported training units throughout Exercise Northern Strike.







FORT CUSTER TRAINING CENTER

FCTC

Commander: LTC Peter Newman

Fort Custer Training Center is located in portions of Kalamazoo and Calhoun counties within the southwest portion of Michigan's lower peninsula. This 7,570-acre military training facility is situated between Interstate 94 to the south and the Kalamazoo River to the north and is managed by the DMVA under license from the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers and is 100% federally owned. DMVA manages FCTC ranges and training areas and has full natural resource management responsibility. Of the total, more than 6,813 acres (including the 2,601-acre Impact Area) are undeveloped and comprised forests, fens, swamps, and prairie remaining acreage, which accurais the parthern portion of the base is developed for training and contament greage, which occupies the northern portion of the base, is developed for training and cantonment areas.

The mission of Fort Custer Training Center is to provide a regional warrior focused training environment in support of deployment operations, unit readiness, homeland security and state emergencies. To enable this training, Fort Custer provides ranges, training areas, road networks, land navigation, Military Operations in Urban Terrain sites, Training Simulators, Leadership Reaction Course, helicopter landing zones, fuel distribution point, dining facilities, billets, classrooms, chapel, Distance Learning Center, Ammunition Supply Point, and other resources based on the customers' needs.

Fort Custer supports a wide variety of DoD organizations such as Army/Air National Guard, Active and Reserve forces from all branches of the military, Defense Logistics Agency, Reserve Officer Training Corps, Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps, Civil Air Patrol, Naval Sea Cadets and Young Marines. FCTC also supports Local, State, and Federal Law Enforcement Agencies such as Homeland Security and the FBI.

The Kelly Johnson Joint All Domain Innovation Center is dedicated to building a MING culture of innovation. The KJJADIC focuses on supporting the innovation ecosystem at home and expanding partnerships with our allies and partners in alignment with the National Defense Strategy. The culture and ecosystem of Innovation created by the KJJADIC positively impact all MING units and missions, enhancing Airmen and Soldiers' readiness and training across all operational domains.

The KJJADIC promotes Michigan as an Innovation Center of Excellence, showcasing our unique infrastructure and mission offerings (e.g., Al, automation, command and control, cyber, joint fires, range capacity, and airspace complex etc.). The KJJADIC continually pursues new and future missions as part of Innovation, most recently with Project Helios and space weather domain predictions.

The KJJADIC offers professional development opportunities via its Academic Industry Military-Hybrid Innovations education program. The MING established the KJJADIC on September 11, 2020, leveraging its key strategic relationships and continues to build successful Innovations with expanding partnerships within Michigan, intergovernmental agencies, the US Department of Defense, its allies, alliances, and international partners.

This transition creates an enduring culture of innovation in the Air Reserve Component to continue the creation of innovators in the DOD.

The MING formalized the strategic relationship with the Joint Staff – Joint Personnel Recovery Agency, creating a pathway for the KJJADIC and NADWC to directly support JPRA experimentation and innovation supporting national efforts in the command and control of

identifying, locating, tracking, and rescuing isolated personnel.

Executing the NGB's only Air Force Innovation Center supported tactical funding indcrease program at the field level with BundlAR. The virtual reality company in conjunction with the KJJÅDIC is leading efforts to revolutionize augmented reality training for the USAF Air and Education Command.

EXERCISE NORTHERN STRIKE 2024 SERIES OPERATIONS

Led Joint Staff/Joint Personnel Recovery Agency collaboration conducting a demonstration of the PR Report Locate Tool during an Air Force Special Operations Command maritime recovery operation of an isolated person in a survival raft on Lake Huron.

Successfully supported the Joint Personnel Recovery Agency with the 217th Air Operations Group, 152nd Air Operations Group, 122nd Fighter Wing and USCENTCOM experiment with the PRRL-T during 19 mass isolating scenarios, each with up to 28 survival radio activations (156 total). Six Personnel Recovery Control Center Controllers were separated into two groups to evaluate avisting practices against RRNL-T during the activations and the results were evaluated by existing practices against PRRL-T during the activations, and the results were examined by independent data scientists for validation. The recorded efforts will steer future JPRA

Cyber Range demonstrated future training capabilities, ensuring U.S. and allied forces remain prepared to meet evolving cyber challenges. Joint forces and partner nation troops accomplished high-threat training for future ops. Validated Visto360 advanced artificial intelligence for Synthetic Aperture Radar imagery analysis, which played a critical role in EXERCISE Northern Strike 2024. Their Space Low Earth Orbit SAR image interpretation technology was central to the exercise, showcasing their Hybrid Space Architecture II and high-performance

edge computing.

Highlighted Nexă3D, in collaboration with Additive At Scale, demonstrated the HSE 280i HT 3D Printer's capability to produce essential components and drone parts using advanced materials. Deployed within an ISU-90 container across Oscoda, Alpena CRTC, and Camp Grayling, the exercise highlighted the transformative potential of on-demand additive manufacturing in operational scenarios. Key outcomes included rapid deployment and immediate manufacturing readiness, with the system fully operational within one hour of unloading.

Demonstrated Bluefilte's NEXTGEN autopidit flight control system and new moving landing zone

software for deploying ACE medical logistics from an unmanned aerial system to resupply a boat

on Lake Huron while in an established hover over the intended drop off location.

Showcased Torrey Pines Logic Free Space Optical Comms delivering 20MBS, voice and video at 1

KM range with no RF emissions.

Demonstrated Skypad's Mobile Optical System, highlighting its advanced capabilities and potential for future integration into Air Force operations. The MOS showcased exceptional user interface simplicity, operational adaptability, and interoperability across various drone platforms, marking it as a promising tool for future Air Force applications.

Bexsom Biomed

AIM-HI Cohort 5 developed the solution to incorporate Bexson's Rapid Injectable Controllable Ketamine wearable infusion device for non-opioid pain management in contested environments. RIC-K delivers BB106, a reformulation of ketamine hydrochloride, consistent with Tactical Combat Casualty Care delivery guidelines for ketamine. RIC-K is a militarized version of their civilian therapy for moderate to severe pain management, intended for continuous subcutaneous infusion administration of up to five days. The RIC-K is compact enough and carried during one UAS flight. The RIC-K capability was an instrumental căpability demonstrated at the Northern Strike 2024 exercises. It was an effective alternative to legacy intravenous treatment capabilities.

Microsoft Federal/Digital CM/Evergreen **Innovations**

The Joint Fires Virtual Tactical Operations Center development effort is a system that allows a fielded commander to direct fire missions with a handheld tablet or virtual reality headset. The entire JF vTOC is a one- person wearable kit as a system of systems. The final system is the software application, which resides in the cloud with a backup version stored in an edge device. The JF vTOC streamlines the Find, Fix, Target, Track, Engage, and Assess processes, allowing commanders to have real-time access to the Command and Control Common Operating Picture while allowing for the appropriate level of authority commensurate with position/rank.

Orb Aerospace (LASSIE)

During Exercise Northern Strike 24-2, Orb Aerospace was tasked with demonstrating their LASSie Airborne Mesh Network, specifically its ability to establish an Airborne Mesh Network Node and integrate it with the NADWC Mobile Operations Center and existing Command and Control infrastructure. This exercise provided a platform to evaluate ORB Aerospace's capabilities in extending communication ranges and supporting operational scenarios critical to USAF objectives.

Microsoft Federal/Sythetaic

The KJJADIC has formed a strategic partnership with Microsoft Federal and Sythetaic to sponsor the development of a risk management framework process to acquire an authority to operate for the Rapid Automatic Image Categorization software hosted in an Azure Government Cloud application. Synthetaic forms a five-year strategic partnership with Microsoft for next-generation Al data and cloud solutions. Special Operations Command, Air Combat Command, Naval Special Warfare, and key industry partners such as Evergreen Innovations, ShadowTech Labs, and Persistent Systems. The primary objective of this line of effort was to advance cyber tactics for warfighters and facilitate coordination between cyber operators and other joint fires capabilities.

Torrey Pines Logic Free Space Optical Comms During Exercise Northern Strike 24–2, the Torrey Pines Logic Free Space Optical Communication A-Wave systems showcased their impressive capabilities. The KJJADIC team, working alongside Alpena Cyber Range staff, demonstrated the effectiveness of long-range, non-RF communication systems. Furthermore, the interest generated from other organizations in the Free Space Optical Comms systems is expected to result in operational partnérships that can be explored and developed during upcoming Northern Strike events to facilitate further learning and collaboration.

BLUEFLITE INC (UAS Delivery)During Exercise Northern Strike 24-2, BlueFlite demonstrated the M461 tilt-rotor cargo Unmanned Aerial System by delivering one liter of blood to a boat one mile offshore in Lake Huron. This exercise tested the UAS's overwater communication systems, high wind performance, and adaptability in mission-critical scenarios.

Crux Defense/Nexa3D/Essentium, Additive At Scale

AxleBox and Titan Dynamics showcased a groundbreaking capability during EXERCISE Northern Strike 24-2. Leveraging the Ruggedized Advanced Manufacturing System with a mobile Nexa3D/Essentium 3D printer, this initiative transformed the sUAS ecosystem by enabling ondemand production of customized drones tailored to specific operational requirements. Manufactured a UAS and flew resupply mission and proved capability to repair small UAS in the field.

EXERCISE NORTHERN STRIKE

Exercise Northern Strike is a Joint National Training Capability accredited, Army sponsored program held twice a year (winter and summer) at the National All-Domain Warfighting Center. It focuses on joint operations, including offense, defense, and stability, with an emphasis on contested sustainment, logistics, Combined Joint All-Domain Command and Control, and Combined Arms Live Fire Exercise. Training opportunities include joint fire support with live Close Air Support, integrated maneuver with fires, air mobility, and Command, Control, Communications, Computers, and Intelligence elements of Theater Air Ground Systems. The exercise also strengthens Conventional and Special Operations Forces Interdependence, Interoperability, and Integration. Northern Strike is the premier event for building readiness with joint and partner forces in all domains of warfare.









EXERCISE NORTHERN STRIKE 24-1

From January 22-25, 2024, Exercise Northern Strike 24-1 took place across Michigan, with more than 200 participants from 12 U.S. Military units and industry partners. The challenging, multi-domain training in a near-arctic environment focused on shaping operations for large-scale combat, improving mission essential task proficiency, and coordinating joint fires with ground maneuver elements.

- Special Operations Forces conducted a personnel recovery report and locate tool verification event in support of Joint Personal Recovery Agency- Capture Avoidance and Survival Team's system activation test.
- Northern Strike MPU5 network successfully integrated with Michigan All Domain Network via Starshield, extending the network beyond line of site.

- Two mounted live fire exercises at the Range 30 Complex.
- Special Operations Forces completed six missions and two Full Mission Profile Blank Fire
- SOF simultaneously activated six Combat Survivor Evader Locator and six Shout Nano beacons while Conducting 35-kilometer Evasive Plan of Action movement.

INTELLIGENCE/SCENARIO

Intelligence reports distributed during the exercise expanded the contested environment with further disruption from 17 OPFOR injects and four "Red" Unmanned Aircraft System flights.



ENVIRONMENTAL STEWARDSHIP

The Environmental Team has been actively working to sustain and enhance the military mission across the various Michigan military installations through science-based conservation efforts. Their focus includes preserving healthy landscapes and supporting the species that inhabit them. Notable projects included monarch butterfly surveys, prescribed fires in North Camp, and processing eDNA pollinator samples to track ecosystem health. In addition, the team continued their work on the PFAS investigation, with activities like drilling, sampling, and conducting public outreach in collaboration with local communities. Upcoming in Fall 2025, they will continue efforts for both the Camp Grayling and Grayling Army Airfield sites, with the goal of ensuring a safe, sustainable environment for military training and operations.

CONSERVATION

The Environmental Team conducted multiple projects to sustain and enhance the military mission across Camp Grayling. The team focuses on sustaining the military mission through proactive, science-based conservation and management for the purpose of maintaining and enhancing healthy landscapes and associated species on training lands. We have completed the sixth year of the annual eastern massasauga rattlesnake survey. The entire dataset is currently being analyzed to develop a model that will allow installation managers to asses the population size, status, and health. Fort Custer Training Center is also committed to species recovery, including the Mitchell's Satyr Butterfly reintroduction, showcasing a national model for balancing conservation with military needs.



MING SECURITY COOPERATION DIVISION

SCD

The Security Cooperation Division comprises all Joint activities undertaken by the MING to encourage and enable international partners to work with the United States to achieve strategic objectives. It includes all military-to-military interactions with foreign defense and security establishments that build defense and security relationships; promote specific U.S. security interests; support allied and friendly military capabilities for self-defense and multinational operations; and provide support to the DoD enterprise with peacetime and contingency access to our partners. It is DoD policy that Security Cooperation is an important tool of national security and foreign policy and is an integral element of the DoD mission. SCD activities shall be planned, programmed, budgeted, and executed with the same high degree of attention and efficiency as other integral DoD activities.

The following programs are supported by the MING SCD:

- State Partnership Program
- Overseas Deployments for Training
- Partner participation in MING exercises
- Military Reciprocal Exchange Program

The MING SCD had a productive year in 2024. Michigan welcomed a new partner into the SPP family; several new lines of effort were initiated, and partners and allies found more ways to train in Michigan and participate in events.

The Michigan SCD INDOPACOM desk facilitated the participation of over 800 partners from INDOPACOM during Northern Strike 2024. This was the largest group of foreign partners hosted during the exercise and resulted in improved live-fire readiness for the partner. Michigan also hosted the over 30 instructors from our INDOPACOM partner at Fort Custer, where a Reserve Recall training curriculum was developed and tested. This event sets conditions for future integration opportunities in Michigan and contributes to the partner's overall reserve readiness.





MING SECURITY COOPERATION DIVISION

LATVIA

PARTNERSHIP FOCUS AREAS:

Latvia, with whom Michigan has a 32-year partnership, saw movement on several important lines of effort, through the execution of over 20 SPP events throughout the year. The 107th Engineer Battalion joined the Latvian Zemessardze and Latvian National Armed Forces Joint Staff to survey Selija Training Range and establish a concept to build a range complex. Selija is scheduled to be a battalion LFX and brigade maneuver training area capable of supporting collective training for American mechanized brigades and NATO Battle Groups. It will be the most capable range complex in the Baltic States and enable U.S. training readiness. Michigan supported the design, safety planning and will begin construction in 2025.

Through the help of the Michigan Air National Guard KC-135s, Latvia sent a platoon of Soldiers to integrate into State Annual Training. This level of integration is the first in the partnership history and its successful execution created a foundation for training events in future years.

During Northern Strike 2024, Latvia not only sent Special Operations Forces, Airfield Fire Fighters, JTACs and Engineers to Michigan, but also members from the Latvian Zemessardze Cyber Defense Unit. The CDU partnered with our joint cyber teams to merge cyber and kinetic effects during Northern Strike 2024. This was the first time the CDU and MING worked together in Michigan and integrated cyber effects in support of a Latvian and U.S. Special Operations Forces assault lane.

Lastly the Latvian Chief of Defense was hosted by The Adjutant General, MG Rogers, at NGAUS during Motor City 2024.











MING SECURITY COOPERATION DIVISION

LIBERIA

PARTNERSHIP FOCUS AREAS:

In Liberia, Michigan executed a dozen events that focused on a range of capabilities from medical operations to Non-Commissioned Officer development.

The 177th Regional Training Institute located at Fort Custer, Michigan, supported over 30 leaders from the Armed Forces of Liberia through the development of the NCO Academy Instructor Course. After many years of work, Liberia successfully began its first course in October 2024. The achievement was recognized by USAFRICOM as both the Commander and CSM visited Liberia during the execution of the course.

Michigan's own SGT Paige Davis, of the 464 Quartermaster Company, was selected to fulfill an operations NCO position within U.S. Embassy Monrovia in Liberia. SGT Davis was recognized by USAFRICOM with a Joint Services Achievement Medal and State of Michigan Distinguished Service Medal.

The Chief of Staff of the Armed Forces of Liberia attended Motor City 2024 and conducted key leader engagements with The Michigan Adjutant General, the Latvian Chief of Defense and the Chief of Defense of Sierra Leone. The multinational and whole of government event highlighted the cooperation potential of all four countries present.







MING SECURITY COOPERATION DIVISION

SIERRA LEONE

PARTNERSHIP FOCUS AREAS:

Sierra Leone officially joined Michigan's State Partnership Program in 2024. The signing ceremony in Freetown, Sierra Leone occurred in September 2024. The Adjutant General and support staff engaged with Senior Leadership and Sierra Leone President Julius Maada Wonie Bio to celebrate the beginning of the partnership and set conditions for future engagements.

In November, Michigan conducted the first SPP event in Sierra Leone and will continue to develop engineering, medical, and NCO leadership lines of effort in the coming years













MISSION

Provide military unique skills and resources to support federal, state and local law enforcement efforts to detect, interdict, disrupt and curtail drug trafficking activities within the State of Michigan.

VISION

A safe secure Michigan free from Transnational Organized Crime, Drug Trafficking Organizations and other threats to the well being of Michigan citizens and national security.

FY24 GOVERNOR APPROVED CORE MISSIONS

ANALYSIS SUPPORT

Counterdrug analysts process, analyze and fuse together information legally collected by law enforcement agencies during narcotic investigations. Analysts focus on document and digital media analysis, link analysis, communications analysis and financial analysis. Analysts work at LEA facilities utilizing LEA equipment, computers and analytical software. Analysts are a force multiplier to LEA drug investigations and the successful prosecution of drug traffickers and their organizations.

AVIATION SUPPORT

The aviation support mission obtains by visual, and/or electro-optical/infrared means, information about the activities and resources of LEA developed targets, or to secure data concerning the meteorological, hydrological or geographic characteristics of a particular area. All aerial imagery is provided to LEA for their investigative use and prosecutorial purposes, and no imagery is retained by the Michigan Counterdrug Task Force. Throughout FY24 Michigan's Counterdrug Aviation Section was T-10 deployed in support of the Federal Southern Border Mission.

DRUG DEMAND REDUCTION OUTREACH

The DDRO mission is focused on the prevention and reduction of illicit substance use and abuse. DDRO assists law enforcement agencies and their partnering governmental and community anti-drug coalitions with collaborative efforts and strategies to create healthier citizens. DDRO effectively bridges the gap between overall public health, public safety and public policy greatly aiding primary prevention.



The 110th MSG consists of five squadrons delivering Agile Combat Support. The Group generated 153 personnel for six operations, completing 49,494 deployment days and 12,225 school order days, utilizing \$2.6 million for readiness. It managed 186,000 assets worth \$14.5 million without discrepancies, equipped 740 members with readiness kits, and requisitioned MQ-9 spares supporting 4,900 flying hours.

Played a key role in Northern Strike, providing security refueling, and communications support. Conducted joint logistics with the Marine Corps, staging and loading 14,000 pounds of equipment for their exercise. Security improvements included resolving a five-year crime statistics backlog and enhancing base defenses. Contracting efforts oversaw \$15 million in active construction

projects, improving infrastructure.
Recruiting efforts achieved a 15-year manning high, driving statewide growth. Personnel efforts included processing 166 enlisted promotions, 50 officer packages, 1,131 Case Management System cases, and 108 separations. The MSG processed over 600 DD-214 forms as part of a pilot program to address a nationwide backlog and supporting three Temporary Duty missions to handle 260 stagnant separation packages.

The MSG contributions earned the Wing the 2024 NGAUS Mission Support Trophy. Community outreach included collaboration with law enforcement, joint training events, and engaging 864

students.

MISSION

The MIARNG Recruiting and Retention Battalion conducts continuous recruiting, retention, and attrition management activities to achieve authorized end strength objectives and operational force readiness requirements in accordance with the MIARNG Strength Maintenance Plan.

In 2024 MIARNG RRB recruited 719 non-prior service / prior service accessions. This is an increase of 203 enlisted accession compared to Production Year 2023, a 40% improvement. For the first time in seven years a company within the battalion met their annual mission (Alpha Company). Four platoons made their annual mission (0 in FY23), and 44 recruiters made mission (20 in FY23). The battalion had two Iron Soldiers (having an enlistment accession in every month); the last Iron Soldier was in 2019. MIARNG RRB recruited 21.1% of the overall DoD market share in FY23 the MIARNG market share was only 17.6%. Eleven first year recruiters met their annual mission.

RRB increased its focus and attention to recruiting soldiers leaving the regular army and exceeded its reserve component transfer mission with 80 total gains. It also added 59 inter-state transfers.

The Recruit Sustainment Program was ranked 54/54 at the beginning of FY24, by November 15, 2024 it was ranked 21/54 and improved the Training Pipeline Success rate from 66.5% to 85%. For the first time in three years every section of Officer Strength Maintenance (basic branch, specialty branch, warrant officer) met or exceeded their annual mission. The state extended 1,086 Soldiers in FY24, exceeding its assigned retention mission. Two major subordinate commands, nine Battalions, and 33 companies all met their annual retention mission.

The State Medical Detachment plans, programs, provides and sustains health force protection and medical and dental support to ensure medical readiness, operations, training, mobilization, and demobilization of ARNG units. In accordance with HIPAA, maintains and manages electronic healthcare records of soldiers and units. Oversees the transfer and transition of Soldier healthcare information between units, civilian medical organizations, and federal agencies. Operates in a medical advisory role to the MING Joint Force Headquarters and the Adjutant General. When directed, will augment a state JTF in a medical advisory role during State Active Duty Events, Title 32 Emergencies, and JTF actions.

AVIATION AND SAFETY

During the 2024 training year, the Michigan Directorate of Army Aviation and Safety directly contributed to the success of various Domestic Operations and prepared forces for Overseas Contingency Operations in support of the National Command Authority. Aviation units flew nearly 4,000 safe flying hours while maintenance was able to improve mission readiness for a fleet of 35 aircraft. The Aviation and Safety Directorate made significant gains by increasing the manning level of resources within the full-time workforce, hiring 18 new employees, and staffing 115 employees within the Army Aviation Support Facilities, Army Aviation Operating Facilities, State Safety Section, and Directorate Staff. This full-time workforce made aircraft sustainment operational tempo possible, supporting training exercises, unit training, community events, and senior leader engagements. Michigan Army National Guard aviation forces supported more than 168 missions, flying 700 aircraft mission hours, transporting over 800 passengers, and moving more than 100,000 pounds of cargo in support of DoD units and senior leaders.

CHANGES WITHIN THE ORGANIZATION

The State Army Aviation and Safety Directorate made significant strides in developing partnerships and writing discussion papers to advance unmanned considerations. Training improvements for aviation operations at the National All Domain Warfighting Center.

COMMUNITY SUPPORT OPERATIONS

During the 2024 calendar year, the Aviation and Safety Directorate strengthened community relations by conducting 76 flights and static aviation displays to support various community and recruiting events. Many of these events required multiple levels of approval beyond the National Guard Bureau to the Pentagon. These outreach events improved recruiting and retention of the MING while achieving strategic messaging campaign goals.

NORTHERN STRIKE 24

During Exercise Northern Strike 24, the SAAO staff was assigned to the higher command staff to perform the roles of J3-Air (Operations and Coordination) and Bridge Aviation Element. During this exercise, the staff synchronized rotary aviation plans for creating Air Tasking Order and evaluated training/mission support operations for airspace de-confliction of 158 unique scheduled missions within the two-week period, which also included support for Global Modice.

PARTNERSHIP SUPPORT

During 2024, MIARNG was able to integrate five Latvian Air Force Search and Rescue Swimmers, members of our State Partnership Program, into aviation training events hosted at AASF#1 in Grand Ledge. This training focused on aircraft familiarization, aviation safety, aircraft systems, and initial non-rated crewmember UH-60M flight qualification. This bilateral training event strengthened relationships between partners and increased readiness of Latvian Air Force members.

Since 2018, the Aviation and Safety Directorate has collaborated with the U.S. Virgin Islands Army National Guard to reestablish an aviation program. Since the creation of the partnership, the Aviation Directorate has invested more than 12,000 man-hours in training seven soldiers from the U.S. Virgin Islands operations, maintenance, aircrew duties, and fuel support. Aiding this program advancement, full-time support of the Army Aviation Support Facility #1 assumed control of two USVI aircraft, reestablishing those aircraft to a fully mission-capable status after being non-operational for two years. Additionally, the Aviation Directorate trained five USVI aircrew members to the highest readiness level and prepared the force for future mobilization within USNORTHCOM in support of the Southwest border. During the 2024 calendar year, the Aviation and Safety Directorate provided training resources for USVI aviation soldiers to meet annual training requirements and aircrew readiness standards while assisting with developing a USVI aviation program.

- The GSAB achieved 3,834 safe flying hours, surpassing last year's execution in UH-60 support by over 325 aircraft hours. In total, 3-238 GSAB supported more than 250 missions, flew 3,834 aircraft mission hours, transported over 1,600 passengers, moved more than 200,000 pounds of cargo, and maintained 35 aircraft.

 A credit to the sustained flying hour program and aircraft operational readiness is largely due to the Army Aviation Support Facilities, AASF#1 in Grand Ledge with seven AGR Soldiers and 68 Dual-Status Title 32 Federal Technicians, and AASF#2 in Selfridge with three AGR Soldiers and 29 Dual-Status Title 32 Federal Technicians.

 During FY24, the GSAB worked to establish two new detachments at Selfridge Air National Guard Base: Detachment 7, Delta Company, 3-238 GSAB, and Detachment 6, Bravo Company, 351st Aviation Support Battalion. These assigned units will increase recruiting opportunities in the Detroit area and properly align the force structure for funding allocation.

 Throughout 2024, the unit and Soldiers conducted multiple training events to prepare for future mobilization. Their culminating training event was Exercise Northern Strike 24-2, during which the unit conducted staff operations, tactical command post operations, and aviation mission execution. 
