EMPLOYES SPOTLIGHT: AIR STATE COMMAND CHIEF MASTER SGT. BALABUCH

Meet the first woman to be named as the Air State Command Chief for the Michigan Air National Guard.

LANSING, Mich. - The Michigan Air National Guard's new Air State Command Chief - the organization's senior enlisted leader - outlined how she will approach her new role when she moved into the position earlier this year.

"My goal in the first few months of my assignment is to listen and learn from our Airmen and from my leadership team," said Chief Master Sgt. Jenny Balabuch, who is in her 30th year of military service.

"It's really important to me that I know, not just the intent of my leadership, but also I know the names and faces of our Michigan Airmen and they know mine."

"I actually had to fact check that when I was initially told I was the first," said Balabuch. "Being a woman, or being the 'first' is just not something that I even think about. My focus is on my job and how I can better the Michigan ANG."

Balabuch said that her goal is to connect with each Airman and get to know them on a personal level. One of the keys to achieving this is through the implementation of the Ask the Chief initiative.

"I want to make it as streamlined and simple as possible for Airmen at all levels to communicate their needs to their chain of command," said Balabuch. "By using the QR code, Airmen can connect with me directly and the barriers to addressing concerns can be significantly reduced."

Balabuch replaces Chief Master Sgt. Trever Slater, who held the post for 11 years prior to his retirement in April.





Motor City Conferences: Empowering National Guard Members to Break Barriers

LANSING, Mich. - Juggling one's National Guard responsibilities alongside a civilian career, family obligations and other commitments can be challenging, as any Guard member will attest. At times, it can seem daunting for Guardsmen to prioritize their well-being and personal development amidst the hustle and bustle of everyday life.

However, the Michigan National Guard is teaming up with other government and civilian agencies to help Guardsmen better cope with those and other issues during Motor City 2024. The event is a group of four conferences that will be held back-to-back at Huntington Place in Detroit from Aug. 17-27.

Motor City 2024 is an umbrella term for the four conferences.

They include:

- Enlisted Association of the National Guard (EANGUS) (Aug. 17-21).
- MING Joint Enlisted Professional Development Event (Aug. 18-20).
- <u>National Guard Association of the United States (NGAUS)</u>, (Aug. 22-27).
- MING Leadership Conference (Aug. 24-25).

Maj. Gen. Paul D. Rogers, the Adjutant General of the Michigan National Guard, referred to Motor City 2024 as transformative. The conferences will include various professional development workshops, discussions about the National Guard's future and addition, social events. In conferences are aimed at bolstering military and civilian partnerships, and showcasing the city of Detroit's resurgence as a technology hub.

The event is expected to attract thousands of guests from across the country, including dignitaries and some elected officials. Company-grade officers and enlisted service members can attend for free, while field grade leaders will be charged at reduced rates.

This initiative, supported by the Michigan National Guard, the state legislature, and local sponsors, offers a rare chance for soldiers to invest in their professional development without financial constraints, Rogers said.

"These conferences are all-consuming," he said, referring to the sheer effort and dedication required to orchestrate events of this scale. "It takes an incredible amount of volunteers, fundraising and partners to give these outstanding professional development opportunities to soldiers across the United States."

The conferences, particularly EANGUS and NGAUS, are an immersive experience where guardsmen from across the nation will converge in the vibrant heart of Detroit, a city full of energy and possibility.

"These are not run-of-the-mill conferences — they are transformative experiences that promise to reignite attendees' passion for service, fuel ambitions and create lifetime connections," Rogers said.

"The rejuvenation, constant improvement and revival of the city and neighborhoods are truly impactful," the general said. "As I travel the country and the world, I see that people do not truly know the heart of Detroit. This is our opportunity to show them an amazing, vibrant and exciting city."

In addition to exploring Detroit, these conferences aim to engage every soldier in authentic dialogues with leadership within the Guard. They include packed schedules of workshops, networking sessions and keynote addresses led by industry and military leaders.

This environment is all about mentoring and coaching. Sometimes, we lose sight of that within our organization," Rogers said. "We aim to empower junior leaders to shape and guide the future of our association."

Additionally, the conferences highlight the importance of partnering with industries and involving civilian leaders. Civilian community leaders will play a key role in the events, showcasing products and services tailored for military members. Michigan-based brands will be prominently featured, aiming to reshape perceptions and showcase the state's contributions.

MING PARTNERS WITH MDNR TO IMPROVE STATE **PARKS: IRT PROGRAM**

MARQUETTE, Mich. —The spirit of collaboration echoes through the woodlands and shores of Michigan's upper peninsula as the 107th Engineer Battalion (107th EN BN) of the Michigan Army National Guard joins forces with the Michigan Department of Natural Resources (DNR) to embark on an ambitious journey of state park improvement projects. This initiative is slated to commence in the spring of 2024, with the facilitation of the Department of Defense (DoD). The primary objectives are twofold: to elevate the quality of state park facilities and concurrently enhance the mission readiness of the Guard.

In the serene landscapes of northern Michigan, Engineer Soldiers stand ready to lend their expertise to the construction and repair of infrastructure at Craig Lake State Park, nestled near Craig Lake in Michigan's Upper Peninsula. Beyond the immediate benefits of these projects lies an additional layer of purpose - an avenue for skills training known as Innovative Readiness Training (IRT). As these soldiers engage in construction endeavors, they simultaneously fortify their proficiency in the intricate art of construction, ensuring a robust skill set for future challenges.

The 1430th Engineer Company (1430th EN CO), based in Traverse City, gears up for a transformative year in 2024. Collaborating with the Michigan DNR, the engineering Soldiers are slated to undertake more than eight construction projects at Wilderness State Park, located near Carp Lake in Michigan's

Northern Lower Peninsula. Four of these projects carry a specific request to enhance camping accessibility for visitors with disabilities, aligning seamlessly with the vision set forth by Governor Gretchen Whitmer's 2021 park improvement initiative. Maj. Gen. Paul D. Rogers, director of the Michigan Department of Military and Veterans Affairs and the Adjutant General for the Michigan National Guard, recognizing the significant strides in collaboration, expressed, "The collaboration between the MIARNG and the DNR is a significant step towards enhancing our state parks and facilities so that all Michiganders are able to enjoy the beauty of our great state. This joint effort is a cost-saving benefit that utilizes the skills and resources available. These improvements not only benefit the state parks but also provide our Soldiers with valuable training opportunities to sharpen their skills and contribute to the well-being of the public."

The soldiers of the 1430th EN CO, equipped with expertise in carpentry, masonry, electrical work, and plumbing, are poised to execute critical repairs to rustic cabins, usher in updates to park infrastructure, and pave the way for the installation of the DNR Gaylord District's inaugural Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) compliant playground at a state park of this size and scope.

Rogers, commends the collaborative spirit, stating, "Our collaboration with the Michigan DNR exemplifies the National Guard's commitment to serving our communities. The utilization of our skilled engineering Soldiers from the Michigan-based 107th Engineer Battalion not only contributes to the vital repair of state park infrastructure but also allows our Soldiers to enhance and maintain their skills and proficiency, ensuring our readiness for any mission."

For over two decades, the Michigan National Guard has fostered a robust and positive collaboration with the DNR, exemplifying a longstanding partnership rooted in mutual benefit. This enduring relationship has provided the National Guard with invaluable opportunities to utilize state lands for essential training. The DNR's willingness to support and facilitate these training initiatives reflects a shared commitment to ensuring the readiness and preparedness of the Michigan National Guard. This collaborative history underscores the effective synergy between military training needs and the responsible use of state resources, resulting in a positive and constructive relationship that has endured for more than 20 years.

In a continuation of this legacy, the MIARNG engineers have recently engaged in an innovative collaboration with the Michigan DNR through the IRT program. Launched in 2020, this innovative IRT partnership evolved when the DNR approached the MIARNG, seeking the expertise of its engineers to assist in critical projects. These projects span a range of essential tasks, including the repair of state parks, roads, water breaks on lakes, and the restoration of cabins. The IRT program, a joint effort leveraging military services and community resources, underscores the MIARNG's commitment to enhancing value and cost in tandem with supporting American communities. As the MIARNG's engineers contribute their skills, manpower, and equipment to these projects, the IRT collaboration exemplifies the National Guard's dedication to producing mission-ready forces while providing key services for the betterment of communities.

As a testament to the impact of this collaboration, the 107th EN BN IRT initiative, as of 2023, has resulted in saving the state of Michigan an estimated \$1.8 million in labor costs. These savings, though quantifiable, are but a glimpse of the immeasurable value generated in terms of readiness, skill enhancement, and community support.

Not confined to a single locale, the commitment extends westward as the 1432nd Engineer Company (1432nd EN CO), stationed in Kingsford and Gladstone, joins the partnership. Their mission is to assist the Western UP District of the DNR with a range of improvement projects. These endeavors include the meticulous restoration of historic cabins at Craig Lake, a park favorite since 1954, and the rehabilitation of parking areas at over nine locations across Marquette and Baraga counties. The scope of their efforts spans six individual boating access sites, strategically situated between Negaunee and Champion, aiming to enhance access roads leading to Craig Lake State Park and Van Riper State Park.

Ron Olson, the chief of Parks and Recreation for the Michigan Department of Natural Resources, expounded on the beneficial relationship between the MIARNG and the DNR. "The DNR Parks and Recreation Division is excited to continue our successful partnership with the Michigan National Guard to improve state parks, trails, and boating access sites. This collaboration has helped usher along much-needed enhancements, while providing valuable training for the MIARNG."

Olson continued, "The partnership with the Michigan National Guard marks a meaningful collaboration that enhances the visitor experience. It also reflects our shared commitment to serving the public."

The MIARNG Soldiers adeptly leverage the state park improvement initiative to acquire invaluable construction and repair training through IRT projects. This training, a linchpin in the battalion's deployment readiness, has left an indelible mark on their capabilities. In 2023, the battalion headquarters showcased their engineering and construction prowess while deployed to six countries throughout the U.S. Central Command, demonstrating the far-reaching impact of their training.

Maj. Matthew Brolsma, commander of the 107th EN BN, underscores the significance of the IRT program, stating, "The construction management opportunities presented by the DNR through IRT were truly invaluable to develop our staff prior to deployment. The ability to plan, resource, and execute projects here in Michigan refined our team's critical skills required for engineer mission accomplishment across Kuwait, Iraq, Syria, Jordan, Saudi Arabia, and Qatar, as well as for future operations."

As the IRT portion of the partnership with the DNR enters its fourth year, the MIARNG remains steadfast in delivering tangible assets to the state's public spaces while concurrently building essential training readiness. Lt. Col. Lucas Lanczy, the brigade commander of the 177th Military Police Brigade and a resident of L'Anse, MI, reflects on the unique role of the National Guard, stating, "The National Guard is the only Army service component that allows you to live and serve in your local community; that is why our Soldiers join. What our engineers have accomplished with their DNR state parks partnership is a clear example of what we can do to support our state. Providing professional quality improvements in and around our hometowns while conducting Army training requirements is exactly what our focus continues to be. This project not only enhances our community but also provides invaluable training opportunities for our soldiers to hone their skills."

For almost a year, dedicated Michigan National Guard members set aside their civilian lives and careers to support U.S. national security.



LANSING, Mich. - Feb. 8 marked the homecoming of 84 Citizen-Soldiers belonging to the Michigan National Guard's Alpha Battery, 1st Battalion, 182nd Field Artillery, following their overseas deployment to Al Dhafra Air Base in the United Arab Emirates. The unit, operating the High Mobility Artillery Rocket System, supported operations Spartan Shield and Inherent Resolve in the Central Command region.

"Today, we welcome Michiganders who served our state and nation admirably in uniform back home," said Gov. Gretchen Whitmer. "These 84 Citizen-Soldiers are the best of us, and I am so grateful that they are coming back home right in time for a pure Michigan spring after successfully carrying out their mission. Let's keep working together to support the men and women of our National Guard and their families by having their backs every step of the way."

As the Alpha Battery Soldiers reunited with their families and friends, the battery commander, Capt. Kasey Robbins, expressed his gratitude and pride in the unit's accomplishments. "The dedication and resilience of Alpha Battery has been truly exceptional. Our Soldiers executed their mission with precision and contributed significantly to the ongoing success of operations Spartan Shield and Inherent Resolve," said Robbins.

While the homecoming was a celebration, recent news of drone attacks on U.S. service members in Jordan highlighted the ongoing threats faced by military personnel in the region.

Maj. Gen. Paul D. Rogers, adjutant general for the Michigan National Guard and director of the Michigan Department of Military and Veterans Affairs, commended Alpha Battery for outstanding contributions to national security overseas.

"Alpha Battery's accomplishments during their deployment underscore the Michigan National Guard's commitment to ensuring the safety and security of our nation," Rogers said. "Their dedication and proficiency in operating the HIMARS system have significantly advanced our strategic objectives in the region."

First Sgt. Kaleb Vickery praised the Soldiers' readiness and training.

Marching Through Time: Michigan Army National Guard Officer Candidates Reflect on Leadership Lessons at Gettysburg

LANSING, Mich. - As the first rays of dawn pierced through the thick blanket of mist hovering over the historic fields of Gettysburg on March 28th, the Michigan Army National Guard Officer Candidate School Class 067 embarked on a journey through time. The morning air was crisp, carrying with it whispers of the 3-day battle fought here in which 4,000 Michigan Soldiers took part; over 1,110 of those Michiganders engaged in battle became casualties, a 41% casualty rate. Against rolling Pennsylvania hills and serene countryside, the stage was set for an unforgettable military staff ride for OCS Class 067.

With a sense of reverence, the officers-to-be stepped onto the hallowed grounds where the fate of a nation had once hung in the balance. Each footfall resonated with the weight of history as they traced the footsteps of soldiers long gone. Now casting its golden hues upon the landscape, the sun illuminated battle scars still etched into the earth.



Led by U.S. Marine Corps Col (Ret.) Robert Abbott, the candidates delved into the intricacies of the Battle of Gettysburg, immersing themselves in an eight-hour engagement. The ground that was covered included McPherson (Herbst) Ridge, where the famed 24th Michigan Infantry delayed the Confederate military advance on July 1, 1863, in savage combat. Other locations included Oak Hill, the Mississippi Monument, the Peach Orchard, the Wheatfield, Culps Hill, and The Angle.

At each location, the candidates discussed the many tactical and strategic leadership lessons that can only be understood while walking the terrain.

Capt. Jason Peterson, commander of MIARNG OCS, knows the benefits and importance of conducting staff rides. "This event is one of the key culminating events for the Officer Candidates. Planning and executing staff rides offer our OCS candidates a sense of the hardships that leaders just like them endured during the Civil War, and think about how things are different today," said Peterson.

"We've advanced and have the benefit of technology and improved doctrine, but if you appreciate their experiences back then, it makes you a better soldier. In fact, some of the doctrine we use today in the U.S. Army is borne right from this very battlefield."

A MOMENT IN HISTORY

The battlefield terrain, marked with memorials and plaques, offers a tangible representation of the challenges faced by the soldiers. It encourages soldiers to reflect on the importance of adaptability, leadership, and the ability to make critical decisions under intense pressure.

"Even though a lot of things have changed, it always goes back to the actions of the individual soldier and the courage they show," said Sgt. 1st Class Randall Gill, OCS instructor. "These staff rides not only benefit the officer corps, but there are also many NCO leadership examples to learn from this field."

At the Wheatfield location, the candidates stood in awe of the courage displayed by U.S. Army Col. Harrison Jefferds and his men of the 4th Michigan Infantry as they fought hand-to-hand over control of the 4th Michigan Colors, a handmade gift from the citizens of Adrian, Mich.; the 4th's motto: "DEFEND IT".

On Cemetery Ridge, they felt the weight of responsibility borne by U.S. Army General George Meade as he made crucial decisions about where, when, and how to shift his internal lines, actions that would shape the course of history. Amidst the solemn tranquility of the Soldiers' National Cemetery, they paid homage to the 173 Michigan Soldiers buried here, their spirits forever intertwined with the soil upon which they had fought.




"Some of the most profound examples of American military leadership took place on the fields around Gettysburg," said Brig. Gen. Ravi Wagh, commander of the MIARNG. "This is an excellent opportunity for our junior leaders to learn from these lessons, and the importance of the sacrifices made here cannot be overstated to make better leaders for the Michigan Army National Guard."

Wagh amplified the importance of military staff rides, stating "these [military staff rides] allow us to glance through the lens of 1863, distilling relevance for the future ground combat leaders of the MIARNG, ensuring our readiness and resilience in the face of any challenge."

With each passing moment, the bonds of camaraderie among the candidates grew stronger, forged in the crucible of shared experience. Through the lens of history, they gained invaluable insights into leadership, strategy, and the timeless lessons of warfare. More than that, though, they came to understand the profound responsibility of donning the uniform and carrying on the pledge of an idea... an idea that all men and women are created equal through our shared Constitutional rights.

The Michigan Veterans Affairs Agency (MVAA) is distributing \$2 million in state grants to 13 nonprofit organizations that support homeless veterans and their families across Michigan.

The grants, of about \$150,000 each, will be used for a variety of initiatives intended to assist homeless veterans. These efforts include creating homes out of shipping containers in Wayne County, renovating a 19-room homeless shelter in Flint and creating a four-unit transitional housing complex in the Upper Peninsula.

Gov. Gretchen Whitmer and the state Legislature allocated \$2 million to veteran homelessness prevention for fiscal year 2024. The governor has proposed another \$1.5 million for veteran homelessness prevention in her FY25 budget.

"Michiganders who served our state and nation in uniform deserve our respect and our support," Whitmer said. "With these grants, we are facing veterans' homelessness head-on across Michigan. From renovating a shelter in Flint to creating a transitional housing complex in the U.P., we are taking action to ensure those who put their lives on the line to keep us safe have the support they need to thrive. This is a bipartisan priority so let's keep funding it in our next balanced budget."



A recent report from the MVAA on the state of veteran homelessness says there is an "urgent need for comprehensive strategies to address the challenges faced by our veteran population."

According to the Homeless Management Information System, there were 1,657 homeless veterans in Michigan in 2023, although that figure represents only those veterans who received services. The actual number of homeless veterans is likely much higher.

"Many factors can lead a veteran to become homeless, including mental health issues stemming from PTSD, addiction and a difficult transition to civilian life," said MVAA Director Brian L. Love. "To prevent veteran homelessness, it's critically important to connect veterans to the resources they need to thrive, whether that's health care, emergency assistance, education benefits or help finding and keeping a good job," Love said.

Here is more information on the FY24 grant recipients and how they will use the grant funding:

- 2Marines will fund phase 2 of its shipping container home initiative in Wayne County. Shipping homes are a
 cost-efficient and innovative approach of repurposing shipping containers into homes. Grant funding will also
 go toward five rental homes Washtenaw County that are tailored to the needs of veterans for transitional
 housing, job readiness and family support.
- Center for Higher Educational Achievement in Flint will fund the Homes for Heroes housing program, which offers stable housing and wraparound services such as mental health resources, employment assistance and legal counseling. Grant funding will be used for home renovations.
- Chelsea Hospital will use the grant for its RAVEL program, or Resources for Assisting Veterans-Emergency and Long-term, which aims to expand social services to veterans and their families.
- The Community Action Agency, which serves Jackson, Lenawee and Hillsdale counties, will provide immediate relief, support services and emergency shelter in the form of hotel rooms for homeless veterans.
- · Habitat for Humanity of Lapeer-Tuscola will renovate a home for one veteran family.
- Homes for Heroic Forgotten Veterans will buy an apartment building in Warren and make renovations to address the housing and supportive service needs for female veterans and their families.
- Lenawee Emergency and Affordable Housing Corp. will renovate its eight-room Reconnecting Home, a peer-run program for veterans in need of temporary housing.
- My Brother's Keeper of Genessee County will open the Rolling Hills Veterans Facility in Atlas Township, which will provide transitional housing for up to 10 homeless veterans.
- Peckham Vocational Industries Inc. will fund various support services to prevent veteran homelessness, including emergency shelter, food cards, security deposits, mortgage and rent payments.
- Project Brotherhood Resolve will use the grant for a down payment on a transitional home in Lapeer, as well as
 closing costs, updates to the home and four months of mortgage payments on the home. Remaining funds will
 provide veterans with mortgage or rent assistance.
- Renewed Communities will buy and renovate a residence in Battle Creek to house veterans and their families, and then work with them to remove barriers to create optimal well-being and self-sufficiency.
- Soldier Salvation will establish a four-unit veteran transitional complex for Houghton and Keweenaw counties in the U.P. The grant will fund six phases of the project, including deed recording, ownership transfer, electrical upgrades, building upgrades, appliances, etc.
- Zero Day will launch a veteran family empowerment housing initiative to provide immediate relief, sustainable housing and support services. Grant funding will buy a home in Battle Creek and materials such as siding, roofing, carpet and appliances. Veterans will be hired to renovate, upgrade and maintain the property.

Master Sgt. Chandra Corrado wants to know your "why."

SELFRIDGE AIR NATIONAL GUARD BASE, Mich. – Now the retention manager for the 127th Wing, Corrado has spent most of her 20-plus year career with the Michigan Air National Guard serving in various capacities in the recruiting or retention offices. As the retention manager, her primary responsibility is discussing career options with 127th Wing airmen who are on the

fence about continuing their military career.

"I want to know, 'what's your why?" Corrado said. "Why do you want to leave the military, what are you future goals?" When people enlist, they have a 'why.' As you grow and move into a different phase in your life, your why changes. And a lot of times, there's a path in the Air National Guard that can answer that why, but you may not be aware of it."

For example, Corrado said, Airmen often do not know about educational benefits that may be available to them – or to their children.

think most people know that there are educational benefits from being in the military, but a lot of people don't know exactly what those benefits are or how to plug in to them," she said.

Corrado was recently joined in the retention office by Tech. Sgt. Jennifer Sladdovich. The two NCOs have very different career paths. While Corrado has been in recruiting and retention almost her entire career, Sladdovich has had a more varied background. She started with an initial enlistment on active duty in the Navy.



After a break in service of more than 10 years, she enlisted in the Michigan Air National Guard, primarily seeking assistance to go back to college. She then worked on a joint assignment at state headquarters, completed a short tour working in an administrative position in England and then joined the retention office at Selfridge in 2023.

"I tell people to ask about the opportunities, to be open to it," she said. "The Air National Guard has many different opportunities and I don't think that people are always aware of the options that exist. Talk to your leadership, is there a different schedule that works for you or maybe it is to cross-train into a new opportunity. We have so many good people out here on the base and we need those people to continue their service."

To help wing Airmen better understand their educational benefits, Corrado will offer a brief on Sunday of the March training drill, time to be determined.

"There are state benefits and several types of federal benefits that individuals may be eligible for. We want to help Airmen maximize their benefits," she said.

MING Partners with Armed Forces of Liberia as NCO Academy Takes Shape in West Africa

MONROVIA, Liberia – From Feb. 19 to March 4, 2024, instructors from the Michigan National Guard's 177th Regional Training Institute (RTI), assigned at Fort Custer, Michigan, assessed an instructor "dry-run" event led by the Armed Forces of Liberia (AFL) as the West African nation edges closer to standing up its own Non-Commissioned Officer (NCO) Academy.

The instructors convened at Camp Ware, Liberia, home of the AFL's Armed Forces Training Command (AFTC), to refine their curriculum development, administration and presentation skills. Follow-on meetings also took place at Barclay Training Center (BTC) in central Monrovia, where AFL Chief of Staff, Brig. Gen. Davidson Forleh, received the U.S. instructors and thanked them for their exchange of knowledge with AFL counterparts.

"You could take the instructors from the AFL right now and run a professional military education course anywhere in the world," said U.S. Army 1st Sgt. Brian Brace, State Partnership Program (SPP) desk officer for the Michigan National Guard. "The Liberian instructors are passionate, knowledgeable and invested; they believe in what they are doing."

Michigan and Liberia have partnered for 15 years under the National Guard Bureau's SPP for a mutually beneficial cooperation across multiple lines of effort. The AFL was completely rebuilt after a devastating civil war ended in 2003. For this "new" AFL, developing a self-sufficient NCO Academy has been a long-term goal.

U.S. Army 1st Sgt. Derren Mazza, an instructor with the 177th RTI, began working with the AFL instructors in late 2022.


"From my first visit here 18 months ago, the AFL instructors have come lightyears from where they started," Mazza said. "Even with significant challenges for resourcing and facilities, they look for solutions to effectively orchestrate a course; this is a testament to the readiness of this group to conduct a Basic Leader Course immediately."

The AFL's motto is "A Force for Good." By all accounts, the Liberian military lived up to this creed during ten years of support (2013-2023) for the United Nations Multidimensional Integrated Stabilization Mission in Mali (MINUSMA). The AFL gained a reputation for adherence to human rights and the law of war; ideals the U.S. Government has worked hard to embed into Liberia's military institutions. The Michigan National Guard played a role in Liberia's Security Sector Reform through the U.S. AFRICOM-sponsored Operation Onward Liberty (OOL).

"Michigan and Liberia have come a long way together; even after 15 years, this partnership continues to show its value," said AFL Command Sgt. Maj. Cooper Manqueh. "We thank our partners for helping us develop tools for building strong NCOs, because the NCO corps is the backbone of a strong army."

In their meetings with AFL leadership, the 177th RTI instructors also presented several courses of action to launch the AFL's first Basic Leader Course at Camp Ware. As the AFL's NCO Academy gains momentum, the facility has the long-term potential to become a regional hub for enlisted professional military education in West Africa.

According to AFL 1st Sgt. Austin Doe, an AFTC instructor, the vision for the AFL's NCO Academy is clear: "We're refining today's NCOs to be the leaders of tomorrow," he said.



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

MIARNG ENHANCES ARMORIES THROUGH GOV. WHITMER'S TRANSFORMATIVE INITIATIVE

The MIARNG has completed work on nine armories across the state, upgrading the facilities to better accommodate the needs of the increasing number of female soldiers who are serving in the Guard.

LANSING, Mich. – The Michigan Army National Guard has completed work on nine armories across the state, upgrading the facilities to better accommodate the needs of the increasing number of female soldiers who are serving in the Guard. The work is being funded by nearly \$110 million in state and federal dollars, spearheaded by Gov. Gretchen Whitmer, which will eventually pay for upgrades at a total of 33 armories.

"These upgrades represent a crucial step in ensuring our Armories are equipped to support the diverse needs of our servicewomen," said Maj. Gen. Paul D. Rogers, director of the Michigan Dept. of Military and Veterans Affairs and the Adjutant General for the Michigan National Guard "Gov. Whitmer's investment will have a lasting impact on the readiness and well-being of our forces."

The work is being done as part of the Armory Transformation Initiative, which Whitmer has made one of her administration's priorities. The initiative combines more than \$50 million from the state and more than \$55 million from federal sources to bolster Michigan's military infrastructure. As governor, Whitmer serves as commander in chief of the combined Michigan Army and Air National Guard.

The nine completed modernized armories are in Grand Ledge, Grayling, Traverse City, Ypsilanti, Albion, Kalamazoo, Ishpeming, Gladstone, and Saginaw. Rogers noted that local contractors were utilized at each of the armory projects, ensuring quality work and bolstering local economies by investment dollars within the state.

Upgrades to the armories included renovated bathrooms, showers, and lactation rooms for women Soldiers. The enhancements were essential to provide a more conducive and inclusive environment for all service members, Rogers said.

In 2024, the initiative will target an additional seven armories for upgrades, including facilities in Big Rapids, Sault Ste Marie, Jackson, Bay City, Port Huron, Grayling, and Detroit. The total investment in these projects is budgeted at \$36 million. An additional 17 armories are scheduled for renovation over the next several years, with construction award of a total of \$25.5 million in contracts expected by 2025.

The work at the armories comes on the heels of recent expansion and upgrade work at Michigan Air National Guard facilities in Alpena County and Macomb County.


"Governor Whitmer's investment underscores Michigan's commitment to maintaining a robust and modern military infrastructure," said Representative Julie Rogers, member of the House Military, Veterans and Homeland Security Committee. "These efforts ensure vital facilities that meet the needs of both our service men and women are brought up to date and made available for those willing to serve. Lactation rooms, upgraded showers and locker rooms, and an increase in capacity for facilities for our service women were overdue, and I am delighted to see these improvements being made."

The Michigan National Guard operates 40 state- and federally-owned armories throughout the state of Michigan, where Guard units conduct local training during monthly training assemblies. The state also operates three Air National Guard locations, two major Army training centers near Grayling and Battle Creek, and a state headquarters facility in Lansing.




Caverson expressed the growing excitement for the event in the local community as well as the on-line community which watched the light show live on Facebook.

Ready to Apply for Your Retirement?

The following items MUST be included in a Retired Pay Application: (Please note: This is only applicable to Michigan National Guard retirees! If you served elsewhere, please contact 1-800-MICH-VET)

- 1. Retired Pay Application DD Form 2656 and DD Form 108 Must use the current form or it will be rejected by HRC & DFAS.
- 2. Separation Orders transferring service member to the Retired Reserve.
- 3. Notice of Eligibility (NOE) 20-year letter or 15-year letter if issued.
- 4. Retirement Point Statement NGB Form 23B.
- 5.Reserve Component Survivor Benefit Plan election DD Form 1883, 2656–5, or 2656–6. This must be submitted within 90 days of receipt of NOE. If not, a default selection will be made for you based on dependent information on record at the time.
- 6. Banking information for Direct Deposit you will need the name of the institution, their mailing address, routing number, and account number.
- 7. Beneficiary information you will need to provide the name, address, and date of birth for anyone you wish to include as a beneficiary for Final Pay or as part of a Survivor Benefit Plan.
